## ATTENDANCE

### ACCEPTABLE EXCUSED ABSENCES

- Personal Illness: excused by a doctor's note and/or parent's note. Please note that students are allowed only two (2) parent handwritten notes per nine weeks for illnesses.
- Quarantine in the home;

- Death of an immediate family member;
- Scheduled for a doctor's/dentist appointment. Parents should schedule appointments after school hours if possible.

All doctor, dentist, parent notes should be turned into the office within 24 hours (or one day) from the time the student returns to school to change the absence from unexcused to excused.

**Please pay careful attention to the scheduled holidays and the beginning and ending days of the year. Extending those holidays or shortening the school year for out-of-town trips or vacations is not an excused option. Please plan your family calendar accordingly.** When a student returns to school from an absence, he or she has one (1) school day to turn in their note to change the absence from unexcused to excused.

### **PRE-APPROVED ABSENCES**

- A pre-arranged absence gives the school advance notice that the student will be absent.
- A pre-arranged form is located on the PBS website.
- Students will be allowed four (4) pre-arranged days per school year in which the absence can be excused.
- A minimum of three (3) days written notice to the Division Head is required in order for the prearranged absence to be excused.
- The student then must arrange with his/her teachers for all the assignments to be missed during such absence, and all make-up work must be completed within as many days as the student was absent.
- Work assigned before the absence will be due upon returning to school.

### **MAKE-UP SCHOOL WORK AFTER AN ABSENCE**

- If an absence or tardy is unexcused, up to ½ credit will be recorded for any missed work or test.
- A student who has an absence shall, by the end of the day the student returns to school, make arrangements with his/her teacher(s) for any make-up work. It is the student's responsibility to make these arrangements.
- Students shall be allowed at least the same number of days for make-up work as the number of days absent.
- If a student is late making up the work, the Late Work Policy will apply.
- Excessive unexcused absences may preclude students from make-up work. Excessive would be more than ten (10) absences per semester without a doctor's note.

### **LATE WORK POLICY**

The Late Work Policy will be determined by the teacher and/or the Department Chair, and will also be determined by the nature of the assignment (homework, projects, research papers, etc.). Such penalties can include a percentage taken off the assignment, or an assignment may not be accepted, etc. This includes making up work or tests for an excused or approved absence.

### **EXCESSIVE ABSENCES**

- Students are only allowed up to 10 absences per semester or up to 20 absences per school year

- A student with excessive absences may be in jeopardy of affecting his/her final semester average grade.
- Any class missed counts as an absence which is accumulated over the semester, including all excused, unexcused and pre-arranged absences.
- If a student misses a class, for any reason, this counts as an absence.
- Juniors and seniors are allowed 3 college visits per school year that does not count against the student's attendance.
- A student, who has accumulated more than ten (10) absences per semester due to prolonged illness or other similar long term reasons, will need to have medical documentation to support the absences.

#### TARDINESS

- A student who is tardy to school, checking in after 8:00 a.m., without an excused note, will receive an absence for 1<sup>st</sup> period.
- A student who arrives at school after 8:00 a.m. should report to the high school office before going to class.

3<sup>rd</sup> Tardy: Detention

4<sup>th</sup> Tardy: Two Detentions

5<sup>th</sup> Tardy: Workday (2 hours) and \$20 fee

6<sup>th</sup> Tardy: Workday (4 hours) and \$30 fee

7<sup>th</sup>-8<sup>th</sup> Tardy: In School Suspension

9<sup>th</sup> Tardy: Out of School Suspension (Parent must conference with Dean of Students/Division Head)

10<sup>th</sup> Tardy: Suspension/Expulsion

## WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW FOR HIGH SCHOOL

- Discipline point system in high school. Please refer to the information below.
- Students are required to meet the graduation service hours every year.
- **Cell phones** and other electronic devices may not be **seen, heard or used during school hours.**
  - **First Offense:** Phone will be turned into the office. Student will have the choice to pay \$25 and parent pick up OR Administration hold the phone for 24 hours at school.
  - **Second Offense:** Phone will be turned into the office. The phone will be held by Administration for 24 hours AND the student will pay a \$25 fine.
  - **Third Offense:** Phone will be turned into the office. Parent meeting, \$25 fine, and two detentions. The student will also need to turn in phone each morning.
- ID's must be worn and visible every day.
- Boys must be clean shaven, have appropriate hair length and wear a belt.
- All Friday's are "PBS Spirit Days". All students can wear any PBS t-shirt and/or sweatshirt. Students must wear appropriate PBS uniform bottoms.
- Formal Dress Chapel every Tuesday. See HS Uniform Guidelines for more Dress Chapel Attire information.

- Students participating in after school extra-curricular activities must be in attendance at school for at least four class periods of the school day.
- PBS does random drug testing throughout the school year.

## **Disciplinary Process**

### **Classroom Discipline**

Each teacher at PBS will adhere to a three-step in-classroom discipline plan. The following steps provide a guideline for most minor offenses. Certain behavior such as “disrespect” may cause the teacher to move beyond steps one and two and straight to a “Discipline Referral”.

Teachers will use the following process for minor discipline issues in the classroom:

**1<sup>st</sup> Offense:** Verbal Warning

**2<sup>nd</sup> Offense:** In class consequence at teacher’s discretion and communication with parent (s)

**3<sup>rd</sup> Offense:** Discipline Referral to Administration

## **CONSEQUENCES**

### **WHEN A STUDENT RECEIVES A DISCIPLINE REFERRAL AT ANY TIME:**

#### **Level 1: 1-2 points per infraction**

##### **Examples of Level 1 infractions**

- Classroom distraction/disturbance, Disobedience, Talking in class/talking out of turn, Not following classroom policy, PDA, Inattentive / Off-task / Unprepared for class, Sleeping in class, Disrespect of other students, Inappropriate language, Dress code (ID’s, hair length, facial hair, dress chapel attire, etc.), Unauthorized presence in restricted areas
- Inappropriate Technology Use
  - Playing games, surfing the web during class
  - Download, stream or listen to internet-based music not required for school work while on campus, as this slows down the network for all users

#### **Level 2: 3-5 points per infraction**

##### **Examples of Level 2 infractions – will result in points assessed and immediate consequence**

1<sup>st</sup> Offense      Detention

2<sup>nd</sup> Offense      Workday

3<sup>rd</sup> Offense      In-school suspension

- Disrespect of a teacher/faculty member, Intimidation / bullying, Clinic/detention violations, Lying, Destruction of property (intentional), Skipping class / Leaving class without permission, Profanity, Inappropriate Social Media
- Inappropriate Technology Use
  - Disconnect from PBS network during school hours and connect to a different network system. Students may not provide their own internet via a mi-fi, hotspot or external source.
  - Access any proxy websites

- Copy PBS software
- Install unapproved software on PBS computers
- Sharing passwords with other students
- Installation and/or use of any internet-based file-sharing tool is strictly prohibited. Illegal sharing of copyrighted material is prohibited (like BitTorrent, Limewire, Kazaa, Acquisition, Frostwire, PirateBay and others).

**Level 3: 6-9 points per infraction**

**Examples of Level 3 infractions - will result in points assessed and immediate consequence**

1<sup>st</sup> Offense      1-2 day suspension

2<sup>nd</sup> Offense      Discipline will be determined by point total

- Tobacco use any time, Fighting, Continued bullying / cyberbullying, Threatening another student or teacher, Cheating / Academic Dishonesty
- Inappropriate Tech Use (major technology infraction)
  - Create, send, access or download material that is abusive, hateful, harassing or sexually explicit
  - Accessing network resources that are not permitted for use. This includes modifying other student's files.

**Level 4: 10 or more points per infraction**

1<sup>st</sup> Offense      2 day out-of-school suspension

2<sup>nd</sup> Offense      Review for possible dismissal / expulsion

- Alcohol use on campus, Sexual Harassment, Bringing a weapon to school, Possession or involvement in pornography, Criminal Activity

**POINT LEVELS OF DISCIPLINE INTERVENTION - Per semester**

**Accumulation of 5 points will result in**

- One detention

**Accumulation of 10 points will result in**

- Two detentions

**Accumulation of 15 points will result in**

- Four hour workday

**Accumulation of 20 points will result in**

- One day In School Suspension
- Meeting/conference call with parent/guardian by an administrator
- Student placed on Discipline Probation for the remainder of the semester
- Removal from Leadership positions, removal from overnight trips

**Accumulation of 25 points will result in**

- One out-of-school suspension
- Parent/Guardian conference with administrator

- Removal from Leadership positions, removal from overnight trips, suspended from extra-curricular activities.

### **Accumulation of 30 points will result in**

- Student will receive an out-of-school suspension (# of days to be determined) and administration team will review the status of the student continuing at PBS
- Meeting with Principal and Dean of Students

## **SPECIAL NOTES TO PARENTS AND STUDENTS**

1. Each semester allows a student to start fresh with a clean slate with minor offenses, unless the student is on Behavior Probation from the previous semester is still in effect. Prior discipline events will still be posted and may be used in determining future judgments.
2. The use of “profanity” may be regarded as “disrespect”. This will be determined by the teacher and the Dean of Students. If such a determination is made then the student will receive consequences in accordance with a Major offense.
3. It is impossible to list all the minor offenses. The PBS Administration retains the right to determine levels of offense on a case by case basis.
4. Please note that several infractions may result in points assessed and an immediate consequence.
5. Although the point system is accumulated per semester, if a student accumulates 45 total points in a school year, the student’s status will be reviewed by Administration along with a meeting with the Principal and Dean of Students.
6. Any student receiving 3 out-of-school suspensions may be in jeopardy of being dismissed from PBS

### **Acceptance Policy (After Disciplinary Action)**

Students who accumulates 25-30 points are not automatically accepted for the following school year. Students must interview with the Principal before final acceptance for the next school year is granted. If the student is denied admission for the following year, the student may re-apply after one full calendar year.

### **Disciplinary Intervention Plans**

Intervention Plans are invoked by the administration when it becomes apparent that a student has or may be headed toward a serious problem. It gives the student the opportunity to correct his/her direction and to assume the responsibilities involved in a more mature and appropriate manner. The reasons an Intervention Plan could be invoked are:

- A. **Attitude:** A rebellious spirit which is unchanged after an effort by the teachers/faculty/administration, or a continued negative or uncooperative attitude and negative influence upon other students.
- B. **Misconduct:** Continued deliberate disobedience to a teacher or of school rules and policy, committing a serious breach of conduct in or out of school which has an adverse effect upon the student’s or schools’ Christian testimony.

## **DISCIPLINARY CONSEQUENCES**

### **Detention**



Detentions will be assigned to students with regarding class discipline issues and minor offenses in accordance to the point system and the PBS discipline policies. Detentions will be scheduled for Wednesday and Friday mornings (6:40 a.m.-7:20 a.m.). They will be working detentions (i.e. cleaning campus, etc.). Tardy to detention will be considered a failure to attend. Failure to attend will result in an additional day of detention(s) that the student is serving. Missing a detention twice will result in an in-school suspension.

### **Saturday Workday**

If a student is assigned a Saturday Workday, it will be held on the scheduled Saturday beginning at 8:00 a.m. and ending at 10:00 a.m. (two hours and a \$20 fee) or ending at 12:00 p.m. (four hours and a \$30 fee). The penalty for missing a Saturday Workday is an additional workday along with the workday missed.

### **In-School Suspensions**

An in-school suspension is a full academic day in length. The student will be placed in the school office supervised by faculty and/or administrator for the entire school day. The student will be allowed to work on assignments given out that day and any other work deemed appropriate by an administrator. Work not completed will receive zero credit. Students will receive 10% off the work that is due for that day. A suspended student can participate in extracurricular activities after school.

### **Assignment of Consequences**

In unusual circumstances, administration reserves the right to assign consequences which may deviate from the normal consequences of an infraction.

### **Suspensions / Expulsions**

Parkview Baptist School reserves the right to suspend or expel a student for misconduct or compromising activity occurring on or off school campus, and without regard for whether the form of misconduct is identified specifically herein, and without regard for whether it is specified as improper off campus. While Parkview Baptist School has no control over activities by students off campus which are not school-sponsored, and does not supervise student conduct off campus which occurs during an activity which is not school sponsored, misconduct during such activity may come to the attention of the school authorities and may result in the administration of discipline, including suspension or expulsion.

A student who is suspended from school, may not participate in a school activity including any overnight trips until the student has been reinstated at school (including weekends). A suspension will not carry over to an authorized school holiday. The suspended student should make up all missed school work, however, he/she will receive up to ½ credit earned on the assignments due during the suspension.

### **Fulfilling of Disciplinary Actions**

All disciplinary actions, including returning discipline notices with a parent's signature, Saturday Workdays, suspensions must be served before a student can receive his/her report card and be promoted to the next grade.

## **PENALTY FOR MISSING A DETENTION OR WORKDAY**

Any missed detention will be treated as a skipped class and will receive an additional detention / workday in addition to making up the missed clinic.

## **CHEATING / ACADEMIC DISHONESTY**

Our Handbook definition of cheating is very clear. All work is to be completed by the student, from daily homework to major research papers. Students caught cheating, having the appearance of cheating, or the intent to cheat will receive penalties. If the cheating occurs between several students, both the student providing the information and the receiving the information will receive penalties. Students caught with a cell phone or using a cell phone while taking a test or quiz will result in an receiving a zero for the assignment. If it is determined that cheating with the phone occurred, then there may be additional consequences. No cell phones or any electronic device may be used during assigned quizzes and tests. If caught with an electronic device the student will automatically receive a zero for the assignment. If proven guilty of cheating, there will be additional consequences given.

## **POLICY FOR TESTING FOR ILLEGAL SUBSTANCES**

The goal of this policy is to assist our students in making good choices and to create a positive and safe community at Parkview Baptist School.

- A student enrolled at PBS may be subject to testing at the administration's discretion. The student may also be subjected to a search of his/her person, vehicle, possessions and locker at any time.
- The administration is authorized to use trained animals in the search for or detection of illicit drugs.
- Prior to testing students, all students will have the opportunity to privately give administration information on whether they will give a positive test. If this occurs, the student will be given a positive action plan for the first admission. They will not be tested at this time, but will be tested in 90 days along with following the positive action plan.
- If a student reports that they will test negative, they will be tested.
- If a student reports that they will test negative, and they give a positive test, the student will be dismissed from PBS.
- If a student refuses to take a drug test, the refusal will be considered a positive test result and will be dismissed from PBS.
- Any student who tampers with a sample, attempts to tamper with a sample, or otherwise attempts to alter or invalidate the testing process will be dismissed from PBS.
- The testing policy for illegal substances applies to any PBS function (social, educational, athletics, etc.) held on the school grounds or sponsored by the school or any student organization.

## **UNIFORM GUIDELINES**

### **General**

- The Division Head is the final interpreter of the uniform policy.
- All students grades 9-12 will display an unaltered PBS ID on a lanyard outside the uniform top.
- All students must wear a uniform shirt under their PBS appropriate sweatshirt or jacket.
- Everyday dress for boys must include a belt.
- All pants and shorts must be neatly hemmed and not rolled, cut, or frayed.
- All non-banded shirts must be tucked in.
- Uniform items must be purchased from the PBS approved vendor list.
- Shorts, skirts, skorts and jumpers should be no shorter than 3 inches above the knee.
- Short-sleeved, solid white undershirts may be worn under the uniform shirt, no colored t-shirts.
- Students can wear PBS t-shirts and any PBS sweatshirt on Friday "Spirit Days" with uniform bottoms.

### **Outerwear**

- No jackets allowed in school. If a student wears a jacket to school they must take it off during school hours.
- Not all merchandise sold in the Eagles' Nest is approved for uniform wear.
- Hats are not allowed on campus during the school day.

### **Make-Up**

- 9<sup>th</sup> – 12<sup>th</sup> grade girls may wear make-up in good taste.

### **Jewelry**

- Visible body piercing and tattoos are prohibited. Jewelry must be in good taste and not excessive. Males may not wear earrings.
- Students may not have nose rings.
- Students may not have tongue piercings.

### **Hair**

- Hairstyles that are extreme or attention-seeking, such as Mohawks or outlandish hair coloring are not permitted.
- Male students should be clean-shaven with well-groomed hair, and it should not be excessively long, particularly over the collar, ears, or eyebrows.
- The administration may require that a student cut his hair.

### **We respectfully ask parents to assist the school by:**

- Purchasing only regulation apparel;
- Maintaining an adequate supply of laundered uniforms;
- Insisting that the student come to school with the required apparel, including rain gear during inclement weather.
- Parents may be requested to bring regulation apparel to school or keep the student at home until the violation has been corrected and meets administrative approval. Absences due to dress code and haircut violations are unexcused.

## **DAILY UNIFORM TOPS**

- White or Red Polo with **P** logo (long or short sleeve, banded or non-banded)
- May wear plain white undershirt (long or short sleeve, no writing that shows through)
- White Oxford Shirt with **P** logo (long or short sleeve)
- **HIGH SCHOOL:** Lanyard and ID required daily

**GIRLS:** Plaid Jumper with or without Oxford blouse underneath - (no shorter than 3 inches above the knee)

## **DAILY UNIFORM BOTTOMS**

### **BOYS AND GIRLS:**

- Navy Shorts (7-inch inseam for Girls) or Navy Pants (Purchased from Inkas or Schooltime)

### **GIRLS**

**(All plaid must be purchased from Inkas or SchoolTime)**

- Plaid Shorts (7-inch inseam)
- Plaid Skirt (no shorter than 3 inches above the knee)
- Plaid Skort

### **HIGH SCHOOL ONLY**

- **GIRLS AND BOYS:** Khaki Shorts or Pants are allowed; beginning in 2016-2017 NO Khaki, ONLY Navy from Inka's/SchoolTime)
- **GIRLS AND BOYS:** Shorts and Pants may be purchased from anywhere, but beginning in 2016-2017 must be bought at Inka's/SchoolTime

**(EVERY TUESDAY FOR HIGH SCHOOL)**

- White Oxford Shirt (Long or Short Sleeve) with **P** logo

**SOCKS, SHOES, ACCESSORIES**

**BOYS AND GIRLS**

- Any Tennis Shoes (5<sup>th</sup>-12<sup>th</sup>) or Closed Toe/Closed Heel Non-Distracting Shoe (7<sup>th</sup>-12<sup>th</sup>)
- Navy, White or Black Socks

**GIRLS:** Navy or Black footed tights or ankle length leggings

**BOYS:** Navy, black or brown belt

**FRIDAYS** – All divisions may wear PBS Spirit Shirts with Daily Uniform Bottoms

**REQUIRED PBS COMMUNITY SERVICE HOURS**

- The PBS Service Hour Coordinator is Mrs. Patsy DeShazo ([patsy.deshazo@parkviewbaptist.com](mailto:patsy.deshazo@parkviewbaptist.com)). All information can be found on the PBS website.
- All students are required to earn 10 documented service hours from an approved community organization during each of their high school years (freshman through senior year).
- A list of approved community organizations are available on the PBS website under the "Student" tab
- All service hours must be verified and approved by Mrs. DeShazo prior to participating in the service.
- Forms must be picked up and returned to Mrs. DeShazo for each service project.
- Students who transfer from another school after their freshman year will receive a pro-rated service hour requirement.
- Dress code for all service projects is a PBS t-shirt/sweatshirt and appropriate attire.
